

How and why it all began – November 2018


Just Fund It TX started in Austin ISD when a budget shortfall prompted the possible closing of a beloved fine arts program. Students and parents were up in arms and looking for solutions.

Community activists explained that school funding is decided at the state level, taught students and parents how to advocate for more school funding, and off we went!

In 6 short months, Just Fund It TX had members across the state.

In November 2018, this was the situation...

We united to stop fighting over the scraps left from chronic underfunding of public education.



Just Fund It TX is a non-partisan grassroots statewide campaign promoted by parents, students, and community members with a unified message for our state legislators.

Do the right thing – adequately fund public education!

- 1. Overall spending must increase to:
 - Meet our students growing needs,
 - Provide programs to prepare kids for college, career, citizenship, & life,
 - Attract and retain high quality teachers.
- 2. The state should pay its share to fund our schools at least 50%.
- 3. Money raised for education should be used for education.

All 5.4 million Texas children deserve a high quality public education.
It is in the Texas Constitution!



Just Fund It members engaged...

Parents, students, and educators delivered **OVER 20,000 love letters** to their public schools to the Texas governor, lieutenant governor, speaker and legislators.

Students got **OVER 4,000 SIGNATURES** on a petition to the legislature.


JFITX delivered a "reality check" paper to every legislator the day before the house voted on HB 3.

We had Just Fund It TX day!












Students wrote, collected, and delivered love letters.

Why was this so important...

We were heading into the 86th Texas Legislative Session – where voter turnout was the highest in a half century.

Leaders had been hearing complaints about school funding and property taxes and they knew they needed to address these issues... so they could move on to redistricting.

We had to let them know that we wanted a long-term plan, not an unsustainable oneand-done influx of funds.

What the legislature did...and didn't do


HB 3 – Big Deal!

- Basic allotment increased \$1020
 - Special ed increase
 - Dyslexia allotment
 - Dual language allotment
 - Tiered funding for low income
 - Full day pre-k in formula
 - Money set aside for teacher pay raises
- State share increased from 38% to 45%
- But the glass didn't grow...
- No discussion of new revenue sources
- Not sustainable and not a long-term plan

Once in a lifetime? Let's hope not!




PUBLIC SCHOOL INVESTMENT VS. TAX RELIEF



Total = \$14.2 billion



HB 3 INCREASE TO THE STATE SHARE



There are two ways to increase the state's share:

- 1. Investment in the Foundation School Program
- 2. Tax Compression



SCHOOL FUNDING BALANCING ACT

- Increased the current \$5,140 basic allotment to \$6,160
- Repealed the CEI, High School Allotment, Chapter 41 Hold Harmless, and Gifted and Talented allotment
- Moved to current year values

MAX \$11,283/pupil spending





SO, where are we now?

Even with \$6.5 B more for TX public schools, we are STILL 43rd in per student spending!

Texas spending increased \$650 on average per student. But...so did the national average!

Texas would have had to invest \$44 BILLION dollars more in public education to bring us to the national average.







Dejà vu?

June 2019:


Texas is a little closer to passing Nevada as 42nd in per student spending.

- Nat'l Ave = 12,756 (went up \$230)
- Texas Ave = 8,619 (went up \$134)

*HB3 will increase that by an average of \$650. Still won't get TX even close to the average.



NATIONAL RANKINGS ON STUDENT SPENDING



What happens in Texas affects both the Texas and U.S. economies.



-Texas students account for 10.7% of the 50.7 million students in U.S. public schools.

-59% of Texas children are economically disadvantaged.
-Over 1 million Texas public school children are learning English.

Texas is prospering and experiencing record growth.

Texas has the second largest economy in the US, valued at \$1.87 trillion.

- If Texas were a country, it would rank 10th for highest GDP. ¹
- The Texas economy is projected to grow at a faster rate than the rest of the country over the next five years.²

The strength of the Texas economy depends on an educated populace.

 Texas has a goal of having at least 60 percent of Texans aged 25-34 earn a postsecondary certificate or degree by 2030.

The only way to reach our goals is to substantially increase our investment in educating our children.





What needs to happen next?




We got the "education session" because people voted. But we can do better

Voter turnout increased 60% between 2014 and 2018.



But our work isn't done: 54% of eligible voters still didn't vote.

What to do now?

Contact your elected officials

Talk to elected officials and tell them four things:

- Thank you for HB3. It was a great step in the right direction.
- We are still WAY behind in per-student spending, 43rd, or maybe 42nd.
- We need a sustainable plan and a long-term plan to keep making progress toward being average.
- We are engaged, we are watching, we are talking, and we are VOTING!
